- Focus on cost and quality of residential services
- Partner with SJ96 Subcommittee

Research Activities

- Site visits to 17 localities
- Surveys
 - Every local CSA coordinator
 - Every local Community and Policy Management Team (CPMT)
 - Case managers of 360 CSA participants
 - All Virginia residential providers
- Site visits and meetings with residential providers
- Financial analysis of residential facilities
- Analysis of licensing compliance data and residential program characteristics

Final Report Contents

- Final Report will include findings and recommendations related to:
 - Factors affecting residential expenditures
 - Adequacy of licensing standards and regulatory enforcement to ensure that quality services are provided
 - Importance of tracking child outcomes

Factors Affecting Residential Expenditures

- Availability of lower-cost, community-based alternatives to residential care
- Adequacy of local infrastructure to secure most cost effective services
- Effectiveness of market in controlling rates of residential facilities

Licensing Standards and Enforcement

- Overview of regulatory compliance by residential facilities
- Adequacy of licensing standards to ensure health and safety of children
- Effectiveness of regulatory agencies in enforcing compliance with licensing standards

Child Outcomes

- Current availability of information to measure impact of CSA program
