

### Comparison of Typical Revenue Sharing Authorization vs. Jamestown Revenue Sharing Authorization

Typical Revenue Sharing	Jamestown Revenue Sharing
Subject to minimum 350 prepaid application requirement	Exempt from minimum 350 prepaid application requirement
Revenue sharing begins after first 1,000 registrations	Revenue sharing begins with first registration
Subject to \$25 annual issuance fee	Subject to \$15 one-time issuance fee
Of the \$25 annual issuance fee, \$15 is shared with entity/organization identified in authorization	Of the \$15 one-time issuance fee, \$5 is shared with Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation
Authorization not subject to specific expiration	Authorization expires January 1, 2013
No additional license plates can be issued or reissued in any series that, after five or more years of issuance, has fewer than 200 active sets of plates	Exempt from the 200 active sets threshold
DMV may issue, when feasible, special license plates that are combinations of no more than two series of special license plates authorized and currently issued; in addition to the registration fee,	Upon application from a member of the Senate or House of Delegates, DMV must issue special license plates that incorporate the design for the Jamestown plate and the design for special

<p>the fee for the combination plate is equal to the sum of the fees for the two series plus the fee for reserved numbers and letters, if applicable</p>	<p>license plates issued to members of the Senate or House of Delegates; in addition to the registration fee, the fee for the combination plate is a one-time \$15 (same as issuance fee)</p>
