During the 2004 Regular Session, the House Committee on Science and Technology (HCST) considered and carried over a bill (House Bill 753) that would have limited the availability of social security numbers to general public from public records. Also, the General Assembly passed a bill (House Bill 543) that limits the use of unique identifying numbers (it was enacted with a re-enactment clause). The Committee will discuss these and proposed and enacted changes to the Personal Information Privacy Act.
