These 11 different laws include the following:


- Charitable gaming;

- Travel clubs; and
- Waste kitchen grease transporters.


ORGANIZATIONAL CHART

CHARITABLE SOLICITATION

CHARITABLE SOLICITATIONS

According to the Internal Revenue Service:

- Approximately 48,300 charities operate in Virginia.
- In 2019, approximately \$6.7 billion was donated by Virginians to charities.
- Approximately \$18.3 million a day is donated by Virginians to charities.

CHARITABLE SOLICITATIONS

In 1974, the General Assembly passed the Virginia Solicitation of Contribution law (§ 57-48 et seq. of the Code of Virginia):

- It requires a charitable organization soliciting donations in the Commonwealth to register with VDACS.
- Suspected violations are referred to the Office of Attorney General or a local Commonwealth's Attorney for legal action.

CHARITABLE SOLICITATIONS

The Virginia Solicitation of Contribution law <u>exempts</u> 14 types of organizations from annual registration, including:

 Area agencies on aging, churches, civic organizations, accredited educational institutions, health care institutions, etc.

In total, there are approximately 23,063 charities registered with VDACS in accordance with the Virginia Solicitation of Contribution law.

CHARITABLE GAMING

CHARITABLE GAMING

 Gambling in the Commonwealth is illegal pursuant to §18.2-325 of the Code of Virginia. The only exceptions to this prohibition are the following:

Authorized Gambling Activities

Casino

Lottery

Sports Wagering

Pari-Mutuel Wagering, including historical racing machines

CHARITABLE GAMING

 Charitable gaming is another form of fundraising for charities to fund their activities:

Permissible Charitable Games

Bingo

Instant Bingo/Pull-Tabs/Seal Cards

Raffles

 Permitted organizations are subject to routine inspections; certain organizations are subject to an audit/financial review.

GROSS RECEIPTS BINGO SESSION SALES VS. PLAYER COUNT



PRIVATE SOCIAL QUARTERS

- Chapter 833 of the Acts of the Assembly (2001) was passed by the General Assembly, which the Act removed regulatory oversight of pulltab sales in an organization's private social quarters.
 - No permitting requirements;
 - No financial reporting requirements;
 - No auditing requirements, etc.
- Charitable gaming law does not define what constitutes a "private social quarter."

ELECTRONIC PULL-TABS

- Chapter 264 of the Acts of the Assembly (2007 General Assembly Session) authorized electronic pull-tabs.
- In November 2012, the regulatory framework for electronic pull-tabs went into effect.
- Electronic pull-tabs may be played within an organization's private social quarters or during a bingo session.

ELECTRONIC PULL-TABS

- Charitable Gaming Regulations require:
 - Each game set shall be a finite number of electronic pull-tab tickets.
 - Each game set shall consist of a maximum of 25,000 electronic pull-tab tickets.
 - Electronic pull-tabs may <u>not</u> contain rolling, flashing, or spinning animations.
 - All hardware and software must be tested by an VDACS-recognized testing laboratory; and explicitly approved by VDACS.
 - BMM Test Labs (Las Vegas, NV)
 - Eclipse Compliance Testing (Cleveland, OH)
 - Gaming Laboratories Int'l (Lakewood, NJ)



SENATE BILL 1127

- Chapter 520 of the Acts of the Assembly (2021 General Assembly Session) requires the permitting of pull-tab sales (i.e. paper and electronic) in the private social quarters.
 - Places these sales back under administrative control since 2001.
 - Private social quarters must have controlled access.
- Limits where a bingo session or private social quarter may operate, unless explicitly exempted; existing locations as of February 1, 2021, may continue until June 30, 2022.

SENATE BILL 1127

- Redefines the types of organizations eligible to obtain a charitable gaming permit.
 - Caps certain organizations to no more than \$40,000 in gross receipts.
- Requires all bingo sessions to be permitted by VDACS.

PRIVATE SOCIAL QUARTERS

- Charitable gaming law:
 - Does <u>not</u> define what constitutes a "private social quarter."
 - Does <u>not</u> require organizations to report their pull-tab sales (i.e. paper and electronic) generated within a private social quarters to VDACS.
 - Does <u>not</u> subject pull-tab sales generated within a private social quarters to an audit by VDACS.
 - Does <u>not</u> subject pull-tab sales generated within a private social quarters to the audit and administration fee.

PRIVATE SOCIAL QUARTERS

- Charitable gaming law:
 - Does subject private social quarters to routine inspections.
 - Limits the number of electronic pull-tab devices to 18 per private social quarter; current average is 10 devices per private social quarter.

BUDGET LANGUAGE

Per legal guidance, budget language limits VDACS' authority to approve any new hardware or software for both electronic bingo devices and electronic pull-tab devices until June 30, 2022.
