 - Emerging themes for successful schools:
 - Common mission, vision, goals and buy-in at all levels (leadership, teachers, students, parents, etc.)
 - Building school community and identity.
 - Engaging parents and community stakeholders.
 - Emphasizing personalized learning.
 - Utilizing evidence-based instructional practices.
 - Setting high expectations.
 - Limiting excuses.

Subcommittee #2

School Leadership & Student Outcomes

- Addressing teacher shortages, continued.
 - Challenges:
 - Declining enrollment in teacher preparation programs and growing student populations.
 - Licensure requirements (e.g. testing).
 - Perceived lack of prestige and abundance of career alternatives.
 - Student loan debt.
 - Low pay (compounded by LCI formula in some school divisions).
 - Lack of on-the-job support and training (mentorship, professional development).
 - Job dissatisfaction and low morale.
 - Lack of diversity in the workforce.
 - Potential solutions:
 - Scholarships.
 - Loan forgiveness.
 - Higher pay.
 - Adjustments to LCI formula.
 - Grow your own programs.
 - Teaching fellowships or residencies.
 - Teacher induction.
 - Mentorship.
 - Amend licensure requirements.

School Leadership & Student Outcomes

- Improving professional development for principals.
 - Dr. DiPaola and Dr. Colley, SURN Principal Academy (W&M).
 - Keys to successful principal professional development:
 - Ongoing.
 - Job-embedded.
 - Helps develop deep knowledge of instructional practices.
 - Includes frequent observation of teachers in the classroom.
 - Includes meaningful, supportive feedback to teachers.
 - Goal is to make the principal the leader of the formative process for teachers.
