

Home Cultivation


- Cultivation of up to 4
 plants in primary private
 residence for those 21+
- Plants must be properly labeled
- Must not be visible from public areas
- Must prevent access by minors





Limited Possession & Adult Sharing

- Possession for personal use at residence for adults 21+
- Public possession up to 1 oz. for adults 21+
- Adults 21+ can privately share up to 1 oz. of marijuana with other adults 21+ without compensation





Cannabis Tax

- Medical cannabis exempt from sales and use tax
 - § 58.1-609.10.
 - 23VAC10-210-940.
- Taxes on retail sales of cannabis from 2024 & 2025 adult use legislation
 - Total possible tax rate of 11.625 percent
 - 8% state
 - 2.5% local option
 - 1.125% for school funding





Hemp

- Cannabis plants with less than .3% delta-9 THC by weight
- Legal under federal law
- Regulated by VDACS
 - Products must have less than .3% total THC and no more than 2 mg THC or a cannabidiol (CBD) to THC ration of 25:1





What's Illegal?

Possession

- Of any amount with intent to distribute
- By anyone under 21
- Of any amount on school grounds or school buses
- Publicly of more than
 1oz. of cannabis

Consumption

- By anyone under 21
- Or sharing in public spaces
- (Landlords may prohibit tenants from growing or using cannabis on rental property)

Retail/Sales

- Retail sales outside of the medical cannabis program
- Giving cannabis in exchange of something else (e.g., a product or service)
- Home cultivation of more than 4 plants or for retail use

Travel

- Operating a vehicle while cannabis-impaired
- Consumption or possession of an open container of cannabis while operating a motor vehicle (applies to driver and passenger)
- Mailing, shipping, or traveling interstate with cannabis

Medical Cannabis Program



Overview

Licensed facilities dispense medical cannabis to individuals that meet basic qualifications and have been issued a written certification by a medical practitioner.





Patient Requirements



Meet basic qualifications

- Live in Virginia
- Valid government-issued ID
- Have condition that may benefit from the use of cannabis



Receive certification by licensed practitioner

- Eligible practitioners: doctors, physician assistants, advanced practice nurses
- Parents/legal guardians can get written certification on behalf of minor or vulnerable adult
- Must be renewed annually by licensed practitioner




Present certification at a licensed dispensary

Program Overview



- Virginia divided into 5 Health Service Areas (HSA)
- Limit on number of facilities in each HSA:
 - 1 facility with cultivation, processing, and dispensing operations
 - 5 additional standalone dispensaries
 - 1 separate cultivation location
- Currently 24 facilities (across all types)




Patient Numbers

- Unique patients:
 - **104,840** in 2024
 - **98,396** in 2023

- Reported monthly spending:
 - 32% spent more than \$300.
 - 25% spent \$201-\$300.
 - 24% spent \$101-\$200.

Purchased Medical Cannabis Products






Medical Cannabis Program Patient Satisfaction Survey (2024)

- The CCA issued a medical cannabis patient survey to assess how the Virginia medical cannabis program (MCP) serves patients, parents or legal guardians of patients, and registered agents.
- The MCP Satisfaction survey captured patterns of:
 - Cannabis use
 - Process of obtaining a written certification
 - Purchase behaviors
 - Dispensary experiences
 - Overall satisfaction



The three most reported medical conditions were **anxiety**, **depression**, and **chronic pain**; 62% of survey respondents use medical cannabis for these conditions.





Seed-to-Sale Tracking

- Seed-to-sale consists of an inventory control system that tracks the cultivation, processing, and sale of cannabis and cannabis-infused products
- Virginia's seed-to-sale system went live on July 1, 2025
- Tracking increases available data leading to an increase in public health and safety by ensuring:
 - No diversion of products to the illicit market
 - No illicit products enter the regulated market





Impaired Driving Survey (2024)

- 783 Virginia residents aged 16 or older with a driver's license were surveyed.
- Partnered with SSRS to manage data collection and process, clean and weigh the collected data.
- Data were weighted to be representative of Virginia residents who are 16 and older and have a driver's license.



Perceptions of Drivers

Almost one third (30%) of Virginia drivers believe those who consume marijuana are usually safer drivers. These perceptions are unchanged from 2022.

People who consume marijuana are a danger to others while driving and their driving behavior is impaired

70%




People who consume marijuana tend to drive slower and more cautiously and are usually safer drivers

Perceived Danger Levels of Various Behaviors and Driving

More Virginia drivers continue to rate texting while driving, as well as driving after using illegal drugs or consuming alcohol, as extremely dangerous compared to driving after using marijuana.

- RFP in progress to develop a new campaign in 2025




