Engagement Background

Study Mandate¹

Analyze and make recommendations with respect to:

- 1. The feasibility of establishing a new agency in the executive branch of state government, to be known as the Virginia Gaming Commission (the Commission), under which all legal forms of gaming in the Commonwealth, except for the state lottery established and operated pursuant to the Virginia Lottery Law (§ 58.1-4000 et seq.), shall be consolidated for the purposes of regulation and oversight.
- 2. The timely and orderly transition of the regulatory authority over casino gaming and sports betting, charitable gaming, and pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing from the Virginia Lottery, the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (VDACS), and the Virginia Racing Commission (VRC), respectively, to the Commission.
- 3. Ways to effectively prioritize problem gambling prevention and treatment efforts.
- 4. All potential options to consolidate gaming regulation and oversight and provide a detailed transition plan in support of recommendations.

Our Role

- 1. Providing project management support.
- 2. Conducting independent research and review.
- 3. Reporting on gaming oversight and regulatory models implemented by other states.
- 4. Determining the feasibility and conducting a costbenefit analysis consistent with the establishment of the Virginia Gaming Commission or any other gaming regulation and oversight consolidation options.
- Developing a transition plan in support of any gaming regulation and oversight recommendations.



Review of Cost Benefit Analysis Key Takeaways

- Following a review of costs and benefits, the team deemed options for a consolidated Virginia
 Gaming Commission feasible and consolidation could be pursued
- Although there are additional temporary costs to consolidation, a Virginia Gaming Commission would be more beneficial to the Commonwealth than the current fragmented structure
- Separating lottery operations from a centralized commission would best mitigate the risk of a conflict of interest, while still capturing most synergies



Recommended Operating Model

The Virginia General Assembly may wish to consider Option B Consolidation in the medium-term and Option D Consolidation in the long-term. This new agency would be an Independent Agency.

Setting up the Virginia Gaming Commission for Success

The Option B operating model aligns with the following design principles:

- Maintaining funding of beneficiaries
- Providing the best support to prevent, treat, and provide recovery services for problem gamblers
- Allowing existing employees to continue to serve their customers while benefiting from cross-training opportunities and additional resources
- Creating a structure that can effectively regulate diverse gaming types and sustainable for new gaming types
- Allowing the Commonwealth to understand new gaming types and their impact to the existing gaming landscape
- Bolstering the accountability ecosystem through consistent compliance and regulatory standards
- Providing state and local law enforcement, industry, the public, and other stakeholders with a single point of contact and information



Executive Summary: Recommendations (1/2)

The General Assembly may wish to consider the following recommendations:

- Consolidating all gaming regulatory and oversight operations in the Commonwealth (except VA Lottery) into an independent, centralized Virginia Gaming Commission
- 2 Structuring the Virginia Gaming Commission to maximize forecasted economies of scale, facilitate cross-training, and leverage best practices within similar functions across different gaming types
- Creating the Virginia Gaming Commission (Board) and assigning it regulatory and oversight responsibilities over all gaming types except live horse racing and the lottery

Executive Summary: Recommendations (2/2)

The General Assembly may wish to consider the following recommendations:

- Establish the Executive Leadership team in the VGC and define roles and responsibilities with clear division of duties, including elevating the role of the Executive Secretary of Racing
- Maintaining existing beneficiaries of revenue streams from each gaming type (e.g., HHR revenue continuing to support the live horse racing industry)
- Directing the Virginia Gaming Commission to review consolidating technology systems to increase efficiency of core functions (e.g., licensing, auditing)



The target operating model for the Virginia Gaming Commission is an **efficient**, **cost-effective**, **and strong regulator**. This is achieved through consolidation Option B, which is designed to:

- Respond to new regulatory and oversight needs from emerging gaming types
- Maintain the Commonwealth's commitment to the horse racing and charitable gaming industries
- Capture long-term forecasted economies of scale and operational efficiencies in staffing and technology as the gaming industry continues its rapid growth
- Increase transparency through centralized annual reporting to the public and the Virginia government and increase accountability for gaming regulation and oversight
- Facilitate a consistent state-wide problem gambling strategy across gaming types
- Clarify the points of contact for key stakeholders (e.g., Virginia State Police [VSP] and local law enforcement, legislators, players, industry) by:
 - · Creating a centralized source of specialized information and resources for gaming
 - Encouraging effective collaboration with VSP Office of Gaming Enforcement to combat gamingrelated criminal activity across all gaming types



Regulating live horse racing involves non-gaming matters such as equine health, animal welfare, breeding standards, and drug testing of horses and jockeys.

Crafting regulations for these matters requires a degree of expertise specific to live horse racing.

Overview of New Role

- Promulgating and adopting regulations governing the operation of live horse racing in the Commonwealth
- Jurisdiction and supervision over all licensed horse racing

Key Benefit

 Maintains regulatory power over live horse racing within a board that has the specific knowledge and expertise to effectively develop informed regulations and policies

Transferring certain Virginia Racing Commission (Board) responsibilities to the Virginia Gaming Commission (Board)

As part of the transition to a consolidated model, HHR, ADW, and simulcast racing regulation and oversight would move to the VGC (Board).

 HHR, ADW, and simulcast racing permits and license standards could be set by the same board that regulates other forms of electronic/digital gaming

Key Consideration

- HHR, ADW, and simulcast racing all use pari-mutuel wagering, which has certain intricacies and nuances that must be considered when establishing regulations
 - The VGC (Board) could leverage the expertise of the Executive Secretary of Racing and the VRC (Board) representative on the VGC (Board) for all matters related to these gaming types





Recommendation 9: Maintaining existing beneficiaries of revenue streams from each gaming type through transition (e.g., HHR revenue continues to support live horse racing industry)

Currently, the proceeds (e.g., tax revenue, licensing fees) from each gaming type in Virginia have specific beneficiaries and funds:

While the regulation and oversight of certain gaming types would transfer to the VGC (Board) (e.g., charitable gaming, HHR), maintaining existing beneficiaries minimizes disruption and maintains current goals of existing policy.

 As an example, while HHR would be regulated by the Virginia Gaming Commission (Board) rather than the Virginia Racing Commission (Board), proceeds from HHR could continue to support the Virginia horseracing industry, as originally intended when HHR was legalized. Key Consideration: Funding for the oversight of each gaming type also comes from a small portion of the money generated by each gaming type (e.g., a portion of the fees collected from charitable gaming fund VDACS OCRP oversight operations for charitable gaming). These funding sources may have to be reexamined, as appropriate.

Recommendation 10: Directing the Virginia Gaming Commission to review consolidating technology systems to increase efficiency of core functions (e.g., licensing, auditing)

Benefits of Consolidation

- Increased efficiency of core functions through reduction of manual processes (e.g., using spreadsheets/paper-based processes)
- Standardization of similar process across different gaming types (e.g., case management, auditing, licensing)


Benefits of Centralized Reporting Requirements

- Transparency to the Virginia government and the public
- Sharing of best practices for reporting among gaming types
- Improved forecasting capability across gaming types

Sample of Consistent Reporting Standards

- Operators could be required to report same data across gaming types (e.g., Fantasy contests operators and sportsbook operators could both report on total handle wagered)
- Standardized reporting periods (i.e., calendar year, fiscal year) for gaming types
- Same frequency of reports (e.g., monthly, quarterly, annually)

Recommendation 12: Following implementation of the consolidated gaming commission, consider how to further invest in gaming enforcement



Recommendation 13: Following the successful launch of the Virginia Gaming Commission, reconsider Virginia Lottery operations consolidation

- The level of consolidation could be a phased decision; the Virginia General Assembly may choose to increase level of consolidation in the future
- The Generally Assembly could consolidate with Option B now, and move to Option D in the future, if it becomes apparent that full consolidation efficiencies in Option D outweigh other considerations in Option B


Case Study: Potential Legalization of Skill Games

Implementation Roadmap Key Points (1/2)


- A transition to a fully consolidated Virginia Gaming Commission would take an estimated two years
- To enable the start of the transition process on July 1, 2025, the Virginia General
 Assembly would need to pass legislation during the upcoming legislative session (i.e., January 2025)
- The transition approach is employee-centric, including frequent and clear communication throughout the process
- The Roadmap is designed to limit the potential disruptions to current operations of VA Lottery, VDACS, and VRC and maintain the integrity of the regulatory landscape

Implementation Roadmap Key Points (2/2)

- The Roadmap focuses on three key workstreams:
 - Human Resources: includes all staffing-related tasks, such as a staffing analysis, recruitment, transferring employees, onboarding, and training
 - **Technology**: includes all IT, data management, and information security tasks, such as confirming IT policies, establishing an IT infrastructure, and enhancing/consolidating certain technology solutions
 - **Operations**: broadly includes updating policies and procedures, agency performance management, financial management, relevant reporting, and office space

Implementation Roadmap Approach


The approach to the transition is a three-step process: Plan, Stand Up, and Refine. The two-year Roadmap begins on July 1, 2025, after enabling legislation takes effect, and focuses on the Plan and Stand-Up phases.



The following states recently made changes to their gaming agencies, however, they do not have casinos:

- New Hampshire Lottery Commission consolidated in 2015 to regulate all forms of gaming: sports betting, HHR, racing, charitable gaming, and lottery.
- Wyoming established its lottery in 2013 as a separate entity from the Gaming Commission, which regulates sports betting, HHR, racing, and charitable gaming.³
- DC's Office of Lottery and Charitable Games renamed to the Office of Lottery and Gaming in 2019 after sports betting was legalized.
- Tennessee established the Sports Wagering Council in 2021. Tennessee also has a Lottery and a Racing Commission.

The lotteries in the following states have taken on additional gaming responsibilities as they've legalized: Delaware, Montana, Oregon, Vermont, West Virginia
